Who are South Yorkshire and Bassetlaw Integrated Care System?

- We are Health and Care Working Together in South Yorkshire and Bassetlaw.
- We are a partnership of NHS, local authority, voluntary and independent organisations responsible for looking after the health and care of the 1.5 million people living in Barnsley, Bassetlaw, Doncaster, Rotherham and Sheffield.
- Through working together, we have been chosen by NHS England as one of the first areas of the country to become an “integrated care system” (previously referred to as accountable care partnership) – giving us more freedom to develop **an integrated local system for local people.**
- Working together in this way means that we will be able to better join up GPs and hospitals, physical and mental healthcare, social care and the NHS and give our patients seamless care.

ICS context

Successes so far

We have received national support for our ambitions in that we've secured an additional £17.4m funding which will go towards:

- Barnsley Hospital Children's Emergency Department and Assessment Unit scheme to support the rapid assessment and treatment of children
- Doncaster Urgent and Emergency Care scheme to expand, redesign and improve emergency care
- The expansion of hyper-acute stroke services at Sheffield Teaching Hospitals
- The buying of a new CT scanner and capacity expansion at Doncaster and Bassetlaw Teaching Hospitals - again to improve stroke as well as cancer care

We've also been given almost £0.5m to expand the successful social prescribing schemes that have been taking place (eg, in Rotherham where people are supported to stay well, with more personal control, in their communities - not in hospitals).



National direction of travel

- Moving from being called STPs to Accountable Care Systems/Partnerships to – now – Integrated Care Systems (ICSs)
- Some Integrated Care Systems will be designated this year, moving to all areas from 19/20
- ICSs will have a central role in the planning process with e.g. single system plan underpinned by local plans
- National priorities remain with a focus on key areas e.g. General Practice, Cancer, A&E



Where are we in SYB?

- 18 months since Sustainability and Transformation Plans published, a refresh is now underway
- Refresh likely to include as Priorities for SYB for 18/19:
 - Hospital services review recommendations and next stage
 - Workforce development
 - Supporting ACPs
 - Delivery of national and local priorities



AHPs in SYB ICS

- Workforce development a key enabling workstrand for ICS
- Workforce a key theme in emerging Hospital Services Review recommendations
- AHPs crucial to workforce development
- SYB AHP community driving the agenda – second AHP event, Draft AHP Strategy, development of AHP Council
